This is not just great technology but great news for career military members (I did not say lifers) who are highly trained and highly dedicated to the military, their units and to their country. A paper shredder is designed to be a rubbish receptacle. You and I are not! Search me, O God, and know my heart today; try me, O God, and know my thoughts I pray.

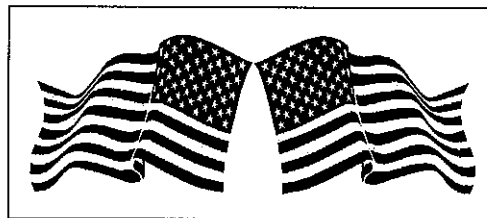
See if there be some wicked way in me; cleanse me from every sin and set me free.

Read Ephesians 4:17-32

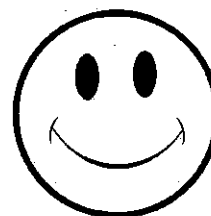
